Dorothy Andrews The Lady Behind the Box

"We help ourselves by helping others to



help themselves."

Every OAHA newsletter prominently features a boxed notice on the front page providing information about Patient Visiting and Support Services. This information is part compliance with UOAA requirements and more importantly, part of our Association's Mission commitment to "help ourselves by helping other to help themselves." Every notice contains a reference to

contact Coordinator Dorothy Andrews.

Who is this Dorothy Andrews? You might ask this question if you have not attended a Holiday Party or have not had Visitor Training yet, or been one of the hundreds of new ostomates that she has seen or coordinated their visit.

Ms. Andrews had her ostomy surgery because of cancer in 1973. She recalls making a personal vow that "if I came through this surgery, I would spend the rest of my life helping other people who had this type of surgery." To date, Ms. Andrews is doing just that.

Ms. Andrews recalls being ready to help people right after her surgery but she was told by her group that she would have to wait a year first and get used to being an ostomate. She has belonged to three different UOA/UOAA Organizations in Chicago, Dallas and finally Houston. Additionally she used to speak each year at the MD Anderson WOCN/ET training before that program was discontinued.

Her visitor work began here by assisting Dave Johnson, Visitation Chairman. After Mr. Johnson was no longer available to manage the program, Ms. Andrews officially took over as the Visitor Program Coordinator.

The process is fairly simple; Ms. Andrews receives a request from a heath care professional and provides a matching service with a trained visitor. Similar types of surgery, gender, age are considered in the matching process, but there is also the 'magic'. Having dealt with ostomates for 37 years, Ms. Andrews is able to listen to the

patient's needs in order to match them much closer to a visitor based on spirit, presence and attitude.

Air Travel and the Ostomate

I don't think I have attended a meeting without hearing personal stories relating to airport security issues since that 'gentleman' placed an explosive device in his underwear. Longtime 'mates everywhere groaned as the story broke because they knew what was coming in one form or another.

Ostomates have always traveled and always held concerns when doing so. That much has not changed. We adapt as needed. The following advice is excerpted from a *UOAA Updated—Special Advocacy Issue*, 23 November 2010.

Understand Your Rights:

- You do NOT have to go through the scanner if you don't want to, but if you elect not to, you will be patted down. That will be done by a person of the same gender as you.
- 2. If you go through the scanner and they note something under your clothing—which is very likely—they will need to ask what it is and will need to carry out a pat-down.
- 3. You have the right to ask that the pat-down be carried out in a private place. If you ask for such a private pat-down, there will be TWO TSOs in the room with you. It may seem intimidating, but it is for your protection as much as theirs.

Please do not feel they are picking on you because of the pouch all they know is that there is something there and they have to find out what it is. It could be a wadded handkerchief in a pocket, papers, a bandaged wound, or something more dangerous—but


they have to find out. You can use this as a teaching opportunity, and overcome any embarrassment you might feel by showing pride in your status as a survivor against great odds.




