5 Reasons Why I'm Finally Returning to an Ostomy Support Group

This past Sunday I attended my first ostomy support group with the Metro Maryland Ostomy Association. The bar was set low going into it. In the past I have gone to other support groups and have been tremendously disappointed. I didn't feel like they were run by volunteers who were suited to lead such a group and the time was spent letting everyone go around the circle and tell their sob story. I know this can be helpful to some people, but it is not what I needed. I found that there was nothing productive or informative about the sessions. But this past Sunday's meeting was pleasantly surprising, and here is why:

1. I was the youngest person in the room by 30 to 40 years.

I was given a heads up by my ostomy nurse before going that many young ostomates are turned off and never return, because when they get there they realize they have walked into a room of their grandparents' peers. I went into it knowing this would be the case and was happy to be greeted by very friendly people. I stood out like a sore thumb but people came up to me and introduced themselves. Many of the people there have had ostomies for much longer than me. I find this a plus and will continue to look to them for guidance and inspiration. I do have hope that if I continue to go I will catch new young ostomates and will convince them to keep coming back. My long-term goal would be to recruit enough young people to start our own group.

2. The session was professional and organized.

Beyond standing up and quickly introducing myself to the wellattended group of about 30 people, there was no sob fest. The

meeting was kicked off by one of the board members (they have a board!) and they introduced the speaker for the day. This week they had a representative from a company that manufactures ostomy products in Germany. These products are brand new to the American market. We got to learn about their products, ask questions and sign up for free



samples. My impression is that for every session they either have a professional speaker or they break out into small groups based on the type of ostomy you have, and you can talk with an ostomy nurse and ask each other questions.

3. They have a WOC Nurse (Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nurse) there at your disposal.

I have only been able to see my ostomy nurse when I have followup appointments with my surgeon. These appointments are about to end (I only have one more...knock on wood) and I'm not sure

This training is important so we can provide a support system for people considering ostomy surgery, having just had the surgery or post surgery. Support for new ostomates during the first six months is critical to their successful recovery and affects their future quality of life. Visitor training builds personal confidence to deal with an array of ostomy-related issues. It can teach you how to tell new friends, family members or co-workers about your ostomy, train you how to share basic ostomy information with new people at meetings and provide an opportunity to answer those small questions you may have. Blake Kelting, Chronic Care Specialist in the Outpatient Markets Division of B. Braun was the presenter for February. Blake shared that the B. Braun group has manufactured and sold ostomy products around the world and now Flexima® 3S is being launched in the US and Canada.

Two piece **Flexima® 3S** is **SIMPLE**—guides into position, easy to fit, easy to clean and intuitive use. Multiple orientation with possibility of 3 pouch positions according to body configuration and preference; **SOFT**—flexible for comfort: floating flange minimizes pressure on the abdomen at application; **SECURE**—Leak-proof due to the low profile mechanical coupling system with audible 'click'. Optional belt fixation for more stability with 3 belt hooks on the pouch.

Base plates (wafers) are available in convex, flat standard wear and flat extended wear. Pouches are available in closed end, drainable, high flow and urostomy styles. There are small, medium and large sizes as well as beige and transparent options. Filter is engineered to be leak-proof and permeable to gases for optimal gas release and deodorizing. Blake offered samples to all in attendance and encouraged participants to visit their website at www.bbrounuso.com.

Group closed out the meeting with a check in by all in attendance. Everyone seems to be on track with wear time and skin care. Appreciate the unused ostomy supplies that were brought in for donation. These items come in handy for ostomates in our community who are not funded.

Northwest Group News

Nearly a dozen mates showed up for Dietician Laura Brimer's presentation. Ms. Brimer provided detailed information on Probiotics and how they could benefit ostomates. A show of hands quickly revealed that although everyone was aware of probiotics, none were currently using them in their diets.

Everyone had questions about using probiotics and their possible benefits. We were assured that they were safe for ostomates. The bottom line was that probiotics could decrease diarrhea by slowing down the intestinal transit time which leads to more absorption of both water and nutrients. This could be a significant factor for those with short gut syndrome or problems absorbing nutrients.

The current recommended dosage for probiotics is a daily intake of 1–10 billion. It sounded like a lot, but Ms. Brimer advised that the bacteria was microscopic. Common probiotic strains are Lactobacillus or Bifidobacterium. Capsules are available for daily intake along with yogurt based or kombucha tea options.

All supplements, including probiotics, are not regulated by the FDA and research is very limited. If you are interested in researching them for yourself, Ms. Brimer recommended modifying your search query to include .edu and .org extensions on articles. This will reduce the amount of unsubstantiated opinion-based stories.

Ms. Brimer additionally took the time to address all dietary questions from attendees on subjects ranging from vitamins to special diets used by diabetics, heart patients and of course ostomates.

The March 15 program will be presented by Kerrianne Pelzl, Houston Territory Manager and Ostomy Specialist with Convatec.

I'll be schlepping out to Baltimore to see her again. While she is very responsive to my questions over email and phone, I get more from face-to-face interactions. At every meeting this group has a certified ostomy nurse. I got in line to talk to her at the end of the speech and was able to ask her my questions. She is a retired nurse and has many years of experience. I found her to be very knowledgeable, approachable and helpful. Too bad she doesn't do private consults in DC.

4. They have a sample table in the back filled with supplies.

I think my free sample radar noticed this table before anything else when I walked into the room. It was in the back and covered in all the various ostomy supplies you might need. Turns out it's there for the taking! When I spoke to the nurse and asked her my questions she pointed out specific products on the table I should take home and try. Before I left I went to get a close-up examination of what was there. I took a couple adhesive remover wipes and skin prep wipes out of the boxes and put them in my purse along with an entire bottle of stomahesive powder. This elderly man came up to me and asked why I took so few. I told him I wanted to make sure other people got to take some home. He looked me straight in the eye and with a very serious tone said, "If you see something you like, take it!" He then proceeded to take the two boxes that were basically full and shove them into my hands. I walked out of there with about \$90 worth of supplies my insurance doesn't cover but I actually need. Thank you sir for looking out for me!

5. I was in a room with other ostomates.

I found it refreshing to walk into the room and know everyone had an ostomy like me. Being in their presence made everything feel normal for two hours.

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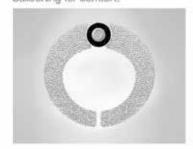
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
