We appreciate Dorothy and Tom Andrews for making it possible for us to enjoy a wonderful time at Pine Forest Country Club.

In March, Dorothy spoke to the Wound Care Nurses at M D. Anderson. She has been our representative to this group the last few years. She speaks four or five times a year to the different classes.

On February 26, Clarice Kennedy and Ed Wood represented the Houston Chapter of UOA at a dinner and lecture that was hosted by Hollister who is the maker of many ostomy supplies. Houston was the first place in Texas that Hollister has hosted such an event. They had invited WOCN and ET nurses from the Houston area, Byram Healthcare, and representatives from Houston UOA. Clarice enjoyed seeing many of her friends. Hollister, Byram, and our chapter had booths that the nurses came to visit during the first hour of the meeting. We met and received information from two dozen nurses who represented hospital systems in the Houston, Conroe, and Galveston areas. This was an excellent opportunity for our chapter to make contact with these nurses. Many of the nurses have been sent packets with our newsletters and brochures. After dinner, we were introduced to a few of the people who do research and development for the company. We heard talks from WOCN's Coni Ellis (MD Anderson) and Ginger Salvadalena (Hollister). From their talks, we learned how WOCN's, manufacturers, suppliers, and the UOA, work together to help the ostomate. We deeply appreciate Hollister hosting this event and allowing our chapter to participate and receive the helpful information. I learned that the next such meeting is to be held in Dallas. I called the leader of the Dallas chapter and told him how much we had benefited from the meeting and to be sure to contact the local representative of Hollister and learn more about when the meeting was to be held.

I received the following from our website and will check at the next meeting for anyone interested:

"I am a 7 year survivor of colorectal cancer. I have a colostomy and am working with a group of engineers to identify potential improvements to current products on the market. We are working this project as part of a Systems Engineering class taken through MIT. I would very much be interested in gaining data from your section members. I lived in Houston for 5 years prior

to my surgery. Please respond if you or other ostomates in the Houston area would like to participate in my needs survey and perhaps even help evaluate an alpha prototype. I can provide printed surveys with self-addressed stamped envelopes for return. We could even explore having a telecom focus group if that is a preferred means of understanding what needs your members have that are not currently being met to full satisfaction levels."

May will be our month for elections. Our Nominating committee, Mary Harle and Mary Lou Hartranft, report the following nominations for the Houston Chapter of UOA: First Vice President-Floyd Swinger and Treasurer-In progress. This would be their first two year terms of office. This announcement will appear in the next two newsletters until the election in May. Is It a Stroke?

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say any bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- 1. ask the individual to smile.
- 2. ask him or her to raise both arms.
- 3. ask the person to speak a simple sentence.

If he or she has trouble with any of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher. After discovering that a group of non-medical volunteers could identify facial weakness, arm weakness and speech problems, researchers urged the general public to learn the three questions. They presented their conclusions at the American Stroke Associations' annual meeting last February. Widespread use of this test could result in prompt diagnosis and treatment of the stroke and prevent brain damage.

A New View of 'Ostomy Odor'

When you think about it, emptying an ostomy appliance is comparable to a person with an intact bowel or urinary tract having a bowel movement or emptying his or her bladder.

How do non-ostomates handle the odor produced by this normal function of their bodies? Room deodorizing sprays are popular, a quick flush of the toilet when defecation occurs, striking a match or opening a window are acceptable methods that have been used for odor management since the invention of indoor plumbing.

Why, then, as ostomates are we so "up tight" about the odor produced when our appliances are emptied?

This constant complaint has encouraged ostomy equipment manufacturers to create products to meet the need for "odor control."

Trouble is, though, ostomy deodorants do not work for everyone, and they are expensive.

Can we consider ourselves "as normal as blueberry pie" as far as waste odors are concerned? Remember, there is no one on this earth whose waste does not smell!

We encourage you to bring your spouse or significant other and members of your immediate family to our meetings.
