A Loving Wife Speaks Out

Family members experience a period of adjustment to ostomies just as ostomates do. I would like to share the process of adjustment I've undergone as a spouse, in order to encourage others. I hope other spouses or loved ones can benefit from knowing the process of change I have experienced concerning my husband Gene's ileostomy, and that they will realize any guilt or pain will pass to brighter days. The change in our lives seems so much smaller than it did a year and a half ago when my husband had ileostomy surgery. Looking back on the process of acceptance, I can see different stages much as one experiences in bereavement:

Denial:

For the year prior to Gene's surgery, we both denied its necessity. I tended to slip back and forth between denial and anger. I was angry that he was denying the inevitable—then I would deny it. When he actually had the operation, I tried to act like nothing had happened. I refused to look at his stoma and wanted nothing to do with the Ostomy Association. This was a mistake. Now I see there were avenues of emotional support the Association had to offer; but I was pretty stubborn.

Anger:

I had little support here in our home community as we were fairly new in the area and I got into some pretty traumatic emotional problems. I became very angry and withdrawn and had to rely on professional help to bring me around to the bargaining stage.

Bargaining:

I was angry with Gene for something he had no control over. Once I admitted that, I was willing to talk with him about compensating for his stoma. I was expecting him to somehow be

a better husband to make up for "what he was putting ME through." When I could have been a staunch support for him, I was expecting HIM to consider



ME. Thank goodness he had his WOC Nurse, the doctors, and the Ostomy Association to help him.

Depression:

I finally reached the depression state and spent a lot of time sleeping. It was difficult to do housework. I started to feel guilty about not giving him more support and for being so upset with the procedure that would put an end to the dreaded ulcerative colitis he had suffered for ten years, a procedure which would probably save his life.

Acceptance:

Now I am more accepting of his ileostomy. I will someday make some fancy pouch covers—maybe a Santa Claus! Seeing how well other ostomates get along in the world has been encouraging to me. What has happened is not something terrible, but something life giving and wonderful.

Kerrianne Pelzl, with Convatec, brought some interesting new products and had samples and books to give away. She demonstrated SensiCare Adhesive Remover using duct tape and her arm. It was impressive to see the tape peel away painlessly. Kerrianne had samples of Diamonds from Ostomy Secrets. Diamonds go into the ileostomy pouch and gels the liquid output. It also has charcoal in it which helps with odor. https://www.ostomysecrets.com/ is a great web site and has several wraps and underwear products, too. Convatec now has an accordion flange that may be helpful to new patients or those with difficulty attaching a two piece pouch.

The Ostomy Association had a booth at the Methodist WOC Conference. Ed Wood talked to many WOC Nurses and signed several up to receive the newsletter. He also heard from a couple of nurses that our newsletter goes into all the new patient packets at their hospitals. Nurses attended from around Texas and Louisiana. Ed pointed to our web site as resource with our old newsletters and the UOAA web site as a resource for New Patient Guides and other information. By the way, WOC Nurse Week was in April, but next time you see your nurse, give a big thank you for all they do to help with ostomy issues.

The UOAA has an Advocacy Committee that works on behalf of ostomates. Matt shared with us that with some vegetables, steaming brings out more vitamin A, and if consuming them raw, more vitamin C is available.

Methodist Hospital Wound and Ostomy 2014 Conference

I attended the Methodist Hospital Wound and Ostomy 2014 Conference. I believe it is the best one that we go to during the year. I met many WOC Nurses from the Houston area, as well as, from Tyler, Austin, Fort Worth and Lake Charles. I shared many of our newsletters and provided both our local website and the national website. I shared that we have many years of former newsletters on our website and that the national website had the booklets about the different ostomies and other topics that might be of interest to the ostomate. I had some copies of the booklets on hand so that they could see what was available.

Two WOC Nurses from a North Texas town said that their chapter was declining and they had stop taking dues this year. They were interested in knowing what to do and I suggested that they might contact other WOC Nurses and the offices of the surgeons who were doing the operations. One of the Methodist nurses said that they always included the most recent copy of our newsletter in their patient's going home packet.

I had started collecting emails of those who were visiting our booth, but one of the conference-hosting nurses advised she would provide me with a complete email list from the conference. This list will be used to update our email newsletter distribution list.

During the conference meeting sessions, I was able to visit with representatives from Stomocur, Hollister, ConvaTec, Byram, and McKesson who owns Sterling (where I get my supplies). The McKesson representative told me about a change in ordering supplies for those who are on Medicare. I have not ordered any since December of 2013. According to her, beginning in January 2014, she said that they had to hire more employees who must talk to those who are ordering. The callers must find from the customer how many days of supplies the customer has and if it is more than 10 days the company cannot send the supplies. I talked to Chuck Bouse, who had ordered since January, and he said that they also ask how many days of paste that he had.

Medicare Patients: Watch Out for "Under Observation" Status

If you're under Medicare and get hospitalized, be aware whether you've been classified as an "inpatient" or are just "under observation." The distinction may seem subtle, as you may receive the same care both ways. However, the difference may cost you thousands of dollars.

The difference in cost may occur two ways: First, if you're only **under observation**, you may need to pay somewhat more for the hospital care itself. When you're an **inpatient**, the costs are covered by Medicare A, which usually pays the full cost after a deductible is met. If you're only **under observation**, the costs are covered by Medicare B, which pays only 80% of the cost. The really big consequences occur if you require care in a skilled nursing facility after your hospital stay. Medicare pays for the nursing costs only if you were in the hospital as an inpatient for at least 3 days. If you were only **under observation**, Medicare pays nothing for the nursing care, so you must pay that whole cost yourself.

Hospitals have been using **under observation** status increasingly in recent years, due to pressure from Medicare to reduce costs to Medicare by reducing improper inpatient admissions.

What can you do as a patient? First, make sure you know whether you're an **inpatient** or just **under observation** (the hospital may not always tell you). If you're only under observation, but think you should be an inpatient, ask your regular doctor to speak with the doctor in charge of your hospital care, and try to get your status changed. If that doesn't work, you can appeal Medicare denial of payment decisions. This can be a long and difficult process, but has a reasonable chance of success if you go through with it.



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
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
