#### **ABCs of Ostomy Care**

The word "Stoma" comes from the Greek word for "mouth." Your mouth and stoma are red, shiny and can bleed a little if touched. If the stoma bleeds more than a tablespoon of blood or does not stop bleeding, call your EMS (911) and health care provider.



Ostomy means "opening into." Colostomy = an opening into the colon (large bowel)

Ileostomy = an opening into the ileum (small bowel)
Urostomy = an opening into the urinary system.

The most common type of urostomy stoma is an ileal conduit. A small piece of small bowel is used to hold urine (conduit), the bladder is usually removed and the ureters are attached to the small bowel conduit.

Peristomal Skin= skin around the stoma. To treat peristomal skin breakdown/irritations/rash, eliminate the causes:

- 1. opening in skin barrier cut too large or too small
- 2. patient needs extended wear barrier
- 3. patient needs convex appliance
- 4. patient needs ostomy belt with convex appliance
- 5. patient needs skin barrier ring Care or irritated peristomal skin or denuded (missing its top layer of skin, epidermis)

"Crusting" steps:

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- 1. Gently cleanse skin with warm water and pat dry:
- 2. Apply dusting layer of pectin powder (Brava or Adapt or Stomahesive powder) Karaya powder may burn.
- 3. Gently pat with alcohol free skin sealant such as Coloplast Brava Skin Barrier Wipe Sting Free or Smith + Nephew No Sting Skin Prep or ConvaTec Sensi-Care Sting Free Protective Skin Barrier or 3M Cavilon No Sting Barrier Film \*(apply only one layer)
- 4. Fan dry skin or use a blow dryer on cool setting
- 5. Application of powder and skin sealant may be repeated twice. For a total of three layers of powder and skin sealant\
- 6. This forms a "crust." When skin does not heal: When skin does not heal with pectin powder or it itches or you see rash/bumps, you may have yeast or fungal rash, use the same procedure as above, but substitute the pectin (Adapt or Stomahesive) powder with an antifungal powder like Nystatin powder (RX) or Medline's Arglaes Silver Powder.

When skin sealants are not effective:

When skin sealants like (3M Cavilon No Sting, ConvaTec Sensi-CareStingFree or Smith+Nephew No Sting Skin Prep) are not effective, use Marathon Liquid Skin Protectant.

Medline's Marathon Liquid Skin Protectant is designed to protect intact or damaged skin from breakdown caused by friction or shear or moisture or digestive enzymes or adhesive stripping. Features: Fast drying and durable. A purple coloring is noted on skin.

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
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#### **ABCs of Ostomy Care**

- 1. Store appliance in a cool dark place away from heat and humidity (not in your bathroom).
- 2. Gather and prepare supplies and equipment Close pouch on new appliance (pouch).
- 3. Gently PUSH skin away from appliance (adhesive). You may use a wash cloth with warm water or remove appliance while showering. Do Not use soap. If it is difficult to push skin away from adhesive, use an ostomy adhesive remover. Use plastic bag for disposing old pouch.
- 4. Cut skin barrier slightly larger than stoma, to allow the stoma to expand.
- 5. May use Adapt ring or Eakin Seal instead of skin barrier paste (Stomahesive).
- 6. Warm Adapt ring or Eakin seal and skin barrier by rubbing it between your hands or with a blow dryer. When it is warm, it will adhere and mold to your skin.
- 7. When applying the skin barrier, the most important seal is at the base of your stoma.
- 8. After you apply the skin barrier, hold your hand over the skin barrier for at least one minute. Then gently repress skin barrier around the stoma.
- 9. Empty your pouch when it is 1/3 full. Too much weight in your pouch will loosen your seal.
- 10. Rinsing pouches are not necessary. They are odor proof. But if you feel the need to rinse the pouch, be careful to use clean warm water and do not disturb adhesive seal around stoma. Rinsing may weaken the adhesive seal around the stoma and cause leakage and peristomal skin problems.
- 11. If it is difficult to remove the feces from your pouch or if the odor bothers you, use a lubricating deodorant

#### **News from UOAA**

via UOAA UPDATE, August 2014

Swimming Pool Access Discrimination. The UOAA Advocacy Committee is working on this issue, as incidents of pool access discrimination have been reported. One such instance involved a urostomate who wanted to participate in a water exercise program at a local community swimming pool. The ostomate was refused entry into the pool by the aquatics director because of the possibility of the pouch leaking urine in the pool. A visit was made to the community center director and information was provided that restrictive action such as that is considered a reason to file a discrimination complaint. Bottom line: the urostomate was allowed pool access. Kindly report any similar incidents so that UOAA may assist you with this issue.

#### **A Few Terrific Travel Hints**

Via The ReRoute, IN

- Change your pouch 24 hours before departure to assure proper complete adherence.
- Take twice as many supplies as you think you need. Pack some of these in or all in your carry-on luggage along with a change of clothing for emergencies.
- You can place scissors with blades smaller than 4 inches in your carry-on or for ease, precut your pouches prior to leaving.
- As you pack, separate liquids from tape, pouches and wafers. Emergency supplies should include baggies or plastic disposal bags you can tie or Ziplock for disposal of used pouches.
- Urostomates need large plastic bags that zip close for overnight drainage. Attach the bag with a clothespin or clip to a wastebasket and then zip close to the drain tube.
- Wherever you are, when you can't find a bathroom or see a sign that says its off limits for public use, find someone who knows your language and say, "I have a medical emergency and must use the bathroom. Where is yours located?"
- Remember, a pouch begging to be emptied is a potential waiting for disaster.
- Protect your supplies from extreme heat and cold that prevent flanges from sticking or plastic pouches from cracking.
- The well known 3-1-1 Rule requires that items classified as liquid, gel or aerosol must be carried in containers no larger than 100 ml. (3.4 ounces), and you can carry only as many of these containers as fit comfortably into a single one-quart (one-liter) zip-top clear plastic bag.

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
