

## Book Review: "If the Battle is Over Why Am I Still in Uniform?"

help themselves."



This book, by Brenda Elsagher, would-be stand-up comic, serious colorectal cancer survivor, wife and mom, will make you laugh, cry, and heave a sigh of relief: that your experiences as a cancer survivor are not nearly as awful as Brenda's!

Brenda was diagnosed with cancer of the rectum in her late thirties. Her first "battle" (and there were many), as she mentioned in the title, was to find a way to describe her cancer—cancer of the rectum.

She referred to it by a certain nickname (unmentionable), because to say cancer of the rectum gave the cancer too much dignity!

The surgeon, who was actually to save her life, seemed to Brenda to be cold and unfeeling, so she called him "the Rear Admiral", an example of the way she used humor as her weapon against her disease. Later she came to realize that what she viewed as coldness was this doctor's serious determination to cure her at all costs.

What was determined by multiple tests was that Brenda's cancer had grown, undiagnosed, so that it involved several internal structures as well as her lower colon. She faced what turned out to be a seven-hour surgery, which included creating a colostomy and a reconstruction of those structures.

It turned out that this doctor, who had thirty years' experience, had operated on only one other woman with the same problems as Brenda. Most doctors had never even seen the situation she faced.

#### **Patient Visiting and Support Services**

Doctors and ET Nurses, please note:

Upon request from a doctor or nurse, a specially trained visitor will be sent to visit an ostomy patient before and/or after surgery. The visitor will be matched as nearly as possible according to sex, age, and type of ostomy. There is no charge for this service. The visitor does not give medical advice. As she recovered, humor helped her through each day, and she carried the military motif as she wrote the book, using quotes about war and battles to begin each chapter. Some examples are:

- Bringing up the Rear
- The Plan of Attack
- I Want to go AWOL
- Assembling the Troops
- Scars and Stripes Forever
- Daily Roll Call

After her recovery, Brenda Elsagher went on to succeed at her long-held dream of being a stand-up comic. However, as word got around groups such as cancer survivors, ostomates and organizations devoted to educating people about cancer, ostomies, etc., she was called upon to use her experience, knowledge and humor as a presenter to groups such as ours. She found that to be her real calling, and is still "performing" and also writing books.

The Ostomy Association of the Houston Area has a library that includes copies of Brenda's book and many others. Copies are available to all members. Just contact our Library Coordinator, Jenrose Foshee.

#### **Central Group News**

Twenty-seven members, including two newcomers, attended our September meeting, to listen to Dr. J.R. Cali speak about hernias and the new techniques available to surgeons.

The meeting was hosted by Second Vice President Ron Cerreta since our President, Terry Marriott, was traveling through Europe and our First Vice President Denise Parsons, was on a cruise, which proves ostomates are able to continue to enjoy travel.

After some technical difficulties, Dr. Cali described the treatment options for incisional and ostomy hernias. He mentioned that the incident rate of hernias for ostomates is as high as 50%. The risk of hernia is increased due to weight gain, heavy lifting, steroidal use or chronic cough.

The classic "fix" has been to relocate the ostomy or repair it with stitches while leaving the ostomy at the current site. An alternate solution has been to repair the hernia with a synthetic mesh, however, the synthetic mesh has been known to become infected and require additional surgery, therefore, not currently the best solution.

The latest and greatest remedy is to use a biologic mesh derived from pig, horse, and yes, human tissue. The pluses of the bio mesh are: it will not become infected and there is no rejection, however, it is not as strong as the synthetic mesh. The cost of a piece of horse bio mesh is \$8-10,000 and bio mesh from human tissue is even more expensive.

Dr. Bailey, a colleague of Dr. Cali, is currently conducting a study using bio mesh at the time of the original ostomy surgery in the hope of preventing future hernias.

Dr. Cali concluded by stating that "the jury is still out" on how and when to treat hernias, however, it seems that the recent breakthroughs are encouraging.

Although hernias may be asymptomatic, some symptoms of hernias to watch for are: bloating, ostomy stopped working, pain, abnormal bulging or a change in bowel function. If you notice any of these, changes, contact your surgeon.

A lively question and answer period followed Dr. Cali's presentation and one question in particular interested me and others concerning which exercises are best for ostomates. Rather than weight lifting, aerobic exercise would be better for an ostomate, also crunches and of course walking.

A special thank you to Dr. Cali for an informative presentation and his continued support of our group.

We look forward to seeing you at our October 18th meeting.

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
#### **Northwest Group News**




