


Patient Visiting and Support Services

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Central Group News

We had 24 attendees at our September meeting. We welcomed a visitor who has had his surgery for less than a month. I was glad to hear that his doctor had recommended looking for a support group in this area. As many of us know, some doctors may do excellent surgery, but have little idea about how to care for the ostomy on a daily basis. Our organization has persisted for over 50 years because we understand the need to share our experiences and to help the new ostomate find their way in this new and sometimes strange world. We also greeted a member who has qualified for the Boston Marathon next spring. We will be cheering her effort.

Our speaker was Lorette Bauarschi, Attorney at Law. Lorette is Board Certified in Estate Planning and Probate Law by the Texas Board of Legal Specialization. She is a member of our Board of Directors and is currently serving as the Treasurer of our organization. Lorette described the planning of an individual's estate as the biggest financial transaction in your life. She provided insights into the questions to be considered, the process of creating an estate plan, and documents that might be involved, including a Will and other documents that plan for possible incapacity. Because of tax implications, continually changing laws, and constantly changing family situations, all plans should be reviewed periodically to make sure the decisions made still make sense. Even though many of us prefer not to think about dying or becoming incapacitated, it is important to go through the process of creating a plan and exploring the alternatives that may be available so that you can be sure that your wishes are fulfilled. Because of the complexity of the legal process and the intricacy of most people's estates, Lorette recommends using a lawyer certified in estate planning and probate law.

Northwest Group News

Seventeen people turned out for Dr. Winkel's urology presentation which included topics covering things that pass in the night. He started out with a brief education on the history of urinary diversions. Using easily understood language, Dr. Winkel provided examples that were both educational and entertaining. He put a personal touch on each subject as he spoke. For example, he identified that the average life expectancy when Medicare was created was around 65. Now it is in the seventies with women living longer than men. He discussed continent diversion options including the Kock pouch, neobladder, Indiana pouch and highlighted their strengths and weaknesses. Dr. Winkel stated that the perceptions of pre-surgical patients and how they felt after their surgeries was an important part of his tailored approach. He considers his role to be an educator on the pros and cons of continent versus non-continent diversion options available as determined by the type of problem, age of patient and disease progression. "It is ultimately their decision," Dr. Winkel said. Upon completing his general program, he took the time to answer individual questions and also facilitated some lively discussion about urinary stoma hernia, blockage, ED problems, and prostate issues. Dr. Winkel is a second generation urologist and surgeon. His father was one of the founding doctors for the Northwest Medical Center. He has spoken at the Northwest Group for several years and is a treasured speaker.

Next month the Northwest Group will host its annual picnic on October 18th.

For those able to alter their usual schedule, they were rewarded on September 12th with an informative and fun session by Anne and Karen from Baytown Medical Equipment. Because of the Labor Day Holiday, the Support Group met on the second Monday rather than the first. "Medical Supplies: Making the Most of Your Resources" was the topic. Anne shared the DME's history, recalling that the store opened in 1988 and has always included a philosophy of "hands on" and "personal touch" for its clients. Products can be purchased at Baytown Medical Equipment or they can ship to your house. One of Karen's specialties is working with the various insurance providers. She can also assist you with the billing process that may get complicated at times.

Anne and Karen brought several resources that included information on Medicare utilization charts with usual maximum quantity as well as several "Helpful Tips" booklets on topics such as Caring for Your Skin, Travel, Relationships and Fashion. The group talked about the guidelines for Home Health services and products as well. Whenever you receive Home Health Services, that company is responsible to provide your ostomy supplies. It doesn't matter if they are providing other services to you.

The group discussed the new competitive bidding legislation which has passed Congress and is moving toward review in the Senate. If passed, Medicare patients would have the choice for home medical equipment supplies made for them by the Government. This is something that the local DME's are very much against! Have you contacted your government representative about this?

Donation of Supplies



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
