About UOAA Advocacy

With the Latin root "voc" or voice, advocacy can be defined as "giving a voice to." UOAA functions in two ways with respect to this voice.

First, we listen to the concerns of our constituents about their needs and about the issues that affect their daily lives. We listen in a variety of ways: at meetings and conferences, when you

post to the Discussion Board, and when you write, call or email the leadership. We also listen to stoma nurses who discuss with us their patients needs, and we listen to manufacturers and distributors who maintain contact with their customers and understand the problems they face.

After listening and collating what we have heard, we are able to speak on behalf of our membership, and in line with advocacy objectives developed by the Advocacy Committee and approved by the UOAA Board.

To whom do we speak? We speak to many levels of the public policy establishment: to Congress through their individual members and the committees; to agencies such as the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the Transportation Security Administration and the General Accounting Office; and to other voluntary health interest groups and coalitions who can help us achieve our goals. These include the Home Care Coalition, One Voice Against Cancer and the Digestive Disease National Coalition.

Second, we encourage and facilitate the individual voices of yourself and all UOAA's members. As we were reminded by the late Congressman Tip O'Neill (himself an ostomate), "all politics is local" in our constitutional democracy. Individual citizens must communicate their needs and concerns to their own members of Congress. We inform you and others about the issues on which we are focusing, and ask that you in turn inform your elected officials at the appropriate level. Through this "grassroots advocacy" we are able to capture the attention of many public policy makers.

October was a great month to be in attendance at the Baytown Ostomy Support Group! Baytown had a grand turn out for this Coloplast sponsored presentation.

Local Skin/Wound/Ostomy Acute Care Territory Manager, Nick Sprague provided the group with Joe Warzecha an ostomy specialist for the evening. Joe did an outstanding job sharing with the group on how Coloplast supports the new ostomate. In addition to a kit with supplies, the new ostomate receives a letter each month that correlates to the issues they will be facing at that time as they adapt to their new ostomy.

Joe reviewed features of one and two piece systems and gave an overview of accessories. In discussing accessories, Joe reminded the group that "less is more". The "more" products you place between your clean skin and the wafer, the more difficulty you may have with adherence. Think carefully about every product you choose to apply to your peristomal skin. Stop using products when they are no longer needed.

For those who use convexity, it is preferable to use pre-cut wafers as this places the convexity right up to the edge of the recessed or flat stoma where it is most needed.

Coloplast patient education materials include photos with instructional materials. This gives the user a way to glance briefly when new to the product without having to stop and read detailed instructions for use. Detailed instructions are available when comprehensive information is desired.

Web Sticker

Our Capwiz site is designed to help with respect to both of the functions of UOAA's advocacy efforts: First, it helps connect you more directly and immediately to the organization, with an opportunity to share your concerns online and in turn to be informed about the latest advocacy-related issues.

Second, it provides a very direct way for you to inform your U.S. Representatives and Senators. Linked to most items under the Issues & Legislation tab (http://capwiz.com/uoaa/issues/), you will find some facts and points that can be sent to your elected officials. We urge you to add your personal experience to these points prior to sending your message. You can either email your message directly from the site, or print it out and fax or mail it as a regular letter. Please note that although clicking on the "send" button is certainly easier and faster, we know that your message will get more attention if you take the time to "cut and paste" both your experience and our points onto your own letterhead or even hand write it!

The site also offers you the chance to receive regular updates on UOAA advocacy activities. If you add your name to the Action E-List (http://cɑpwiz.com/uoɑɑ/mlm/signup/), we will know you are interested in these updates. We will also know that you are willing to contact your Congressmen when we need you to do so.

Another important contact this site supports is the Media Guide (http://copwiz.com/uooo/dbq/medio/). With this feature you can connect with the appropriate writers and reporters at local newspapers and media outlets. Just enter your zip code—you'll see media outlets we bet you didn't know existed! (They reach people that you and your support group need to reach, even if it isn't related to advocacy.)

So take a tour of this extension of the UOAA site, read through the issue material, send messages to your own Congressional members, sign up to receive updates, and check back often. We are glad to have you with us!




