Central Group News

We had 21 in attendance at our November 17 Central Group meeting of the Ostomy Association of the Houston Area for the power point presentation by David A. Thompson, MD, FACS who is a member of the Colon and Rectal Clinic of Houston and is a member of our Medical Advisory Board. We were going to have Dr. Thompson's presentation first, but due to technical difficulties with the PowerPoint file and the fact that Dr. Thompson had a copy he could get relatively close with the computer expertise of one of our new members, Monica, we did what we planned to be second, first.

Chuck Bouse, with the able support of his wife Barbara, was our Treasurer for many years and even before he was Treasurer he did the Newsletter distribution and mailing. He continued to do the Newsletter mailing while doing the Treasurer's job until relatively shortly before Lorette took over as Treasurer. We honored Chuck with a plaque that noted his service to our organization and a gift check which were presented by Clarice. A picture of Chuck and Clarice at the presentation can be seen later in this newsletter, along with a picture of Clarice with Dr. Thompson and one of his patient's Mary.

After Dr. Thompson and Monica returned with a working copy of the PowerPoint presentation, we copied it to Lorette's laptop computer which was used to run the projector and show Dr. Thompson's presentation "Possible Stoma Complications Associated with Ostomy Surgery." Dr. Thompson was introduced by Clarice and he then showed slides depicting the various kinds of things that could happen during the construction of the stoma, and the skin and abdominal wall tissue surrounding the stoma. Some of the things that happen during surgery involve the difficulty of saving the needed visceral blood supply to the stoma which can cause loss of a portion of the stoma if it doesn't receive enough blood flow, and placement of the stoma which if placed wrong can make appliance maintenance very difficult. Dr. Thompson indicated he always tries to use the services of an Enterostomal Therapist to mark the placement of the stoma, usually Clarice, before surgery, so it will be in the best place for easy care and maintenance by the patient. Dr. Thompson also went over other things that can cause those of us with stomas a number of problems including hernias around the stoma, skin rashes due to allergies or leakage, external damage to the stoma, etc., and the various types of things that can be done to prevent or cure such problems. The most severe and persistent problems should be referred to an Enterostomal Therapist, or as the newer ones are called, WOCNs, Wound Ostomy Care Nurses.

I also mentioned that I had received information from the UOAA about some surveys in which new ostomates were being encouraged to participate. Below I give the information that I received; the closing date for the surveys was not clear, but

it was clear that anybody wanting to participate needed to do it soon. I received this information from the UOAA in early November 2008, last month when you get this, hopefully it will be still operational when you read this; it seemed to test out properly when I wrote this article.

If they have an ostomy, or plan to have surgery, here is an opportunity for them to share their opinions about online communities and the Internet by participating in a research study being conducted by **C3Life.com**, a website supported by Hollister Incorporated. Their opinions will be collected through one-on-one telephone interviews taken over the next two weeks. The interviews will be about 45 minutes long and will be completely confidential. Each person's comments will be combined with the comments of other interviewees and the data will be used to improve **C3Life.com**. No one who is interviewed will be identified in any materials or on the website.

As a way of thanking them for their participation, each person interviewed will receive a \$75 Visa gift card. All people who are interested (depending on how you are viewing this newsletter) need only type in, or copy into your browser, or click on the following link to apply for an interview:

More recently, another interview opportunity was sent from the UOAA that was offering less money, but also taking less time.

Earlier this year, Innovative Concepts gathered the thoughts and comments of your group's members regarding ostomy related practices, products and issues. They have contacted the President of the UOAA again and are conducting a similar study. They are interested in talking with more ostomates who have had their surgery for less than one year. If you have a new ostomate in your group that would be willing to participate in this survey, please have them call this toll free number **866-895-6485**. The company is looking to complete this survey within the next several weeks, so time is of the essence.

As an incentive to participate, the company has advised that they will give a \$30.00 honorarium to the person being surveyed and a matching \$30.00 donation to UOAA for each referral, so when your member calls, please have them explain that they are affiliated with UOAA.

I personally think that any way we can help to improve the products or services provided by the ostomy product manufacturers, all existing and future ostomates will benefit.

Hope to see you all at the January meeting and hope that I did see you at the Christmas dinner.




